# Letter

## from the Vicar

Spring started officially on 21 March, and the clocks changed later that same month. Suddenly the evenings are lighter and the air somehow seems more transparent, letting through more precious light. Undeniably, everything is brighter: even my mood feels lighter.

Modern science shows that sunlight has powerful effects on the human body. It produces vitamins in the skin and mood-enhancing chemicals in the brain. Light can be amazingly powerful even at low intensity. Think of a laser.

At this time of year, the Church directs our attention to another light of greater power. Light was the first thing God ever made (Genesis 1:1). During Lent, we allowed God to shine His light of love into the gloom and dust of our innermost souls. And, like all forms of light, we ask him to drive away the darkness.

The most potent illustration of light beating back darkness occurs as we celebrate Easter. We rejoice at the way Jesus showed himself to be the original inextinguishable light when he came back to life. No wonder that Jesus describes himself as the 'light of the world'.

So as we see the evenings become lighter and enjoy the greater transparency of the spring air, remember that they point toward God.



## Thinking about judgement

One of the main themes behind all faiths (including Christianity) is the way we will be judged when we die. Will God find us acceptable or not?

The second major theme is the way that Jesus took away our sins on the Cross. Becoming sinless through Jesus means the judgement of 'Not Guilty' becomes a certainty for those who live in Him. That's why Christians celebrate at Easter and why Easter is the foremost Christian festival.

Hildegard of Bingen was also known as Saint Hildegard and 'the Sibyl of the Rhine'. She was a German Benedictine abbess, writer, composer, philosopher, Christian mystic, visionary, and polymath. She is one of the best-known composers of sacred monophony of her era.

Hildegard was born around the year 1098 into a family from the lower nobility. She was sickly from birth and was the youngest and tenth child.

Hildegard began having visions at a very young age — probably from about three years of age. She soon realised that these 'luminous visions' were abnormal and so hid them for quite some time.

When Hildegard was eight years of age, her parents offered her as an oblate to the nearest Benedictine monastery, where she excelled. She achieved such status that she was designated the group's next superior when only 38 years of age. Her visions persisted all this time and, two years later, the Church ordered her to write down her visions. These visions caused her to see humans as 'living sparks of God's love'.

Hildegard was brilliant. At a time when women carried little official authority, Hildegard was consulted by and advised bishops, popes, and kings. She was considered the founder of scientific and natural history in Germany and wrote treatises on the medicinal uses of plants. She was a composer and founded a community in which her musical plays were performed. And she left one of the largest bodies of letters (nearly 400) to survive from the Middle Ages. We also have records of many of her sermons from the 1160s and 70s; two volumes of material on natural medicine and cures; an invented language; and minor works, including a gospel commentary and two major works of hagiography.


She died on 17 September 1179. Hildegard was one of the first people for whom the canonisation process was officially applied but the

process took so long that four attempts at canonisation were never completed. She was finally canonised in 2012.

In recent years, Hildegard has been of great interest to feminist writers. They note how Hildegard often referred to herself as 'an unlearned woman' and 'incapable' of Biblical exegesis. These statements worked to her advantage because they made her statements (that her writings and music came from visions of the Divine) more believable. They gave Hildegard the authority to speak in a time and place where few women were permitted a voice. Two popes gave her permission to preach in public against the Cathar Movement and challenges facing the Church: at that time such permission was usually only given to men.

Hildegard spoke out against many forms of corruption such as simony — the buying of rank and position.

Recordings and performances of Hildegard's music have gained increasing critical praise and popularity since about 1980.





There were 5 workshops of which we each chose 3. Paul mentioned that those leading were by no means experts 'with a capital E'. More of that later. I chose the following: Praying with Icons, Breathing Space, the Jesus Prayer.

All the leaders brought examples

and Aids to use in the session. This certainly helped you to look at your prayers in a different way. I for one had never thought of using an icon to help me in my prayers. In Breathing Space initially we talked about how busy life is today made even more so because of the technology. We are bombarded by visual and aural stimulation constantly. Then we were asked to not talk to anyone but occupy ourselves in a way that would bring us closer to God for 20 minutes. There were many different ways offered to us to do this, for example a jigsaw. You wouldn't usually connect prayer with a jigsaw would you? In the Jesus Prayer workshop we were shown how to make a prayer rope and an explanation of the many ways it is used. I have to be honest here and admit that I did not know the Jesus Prayer even though I have often prayed with beads. The short break for lunch passed in a flash as we were all eager to get on to our next session.

Obviously I cannot tell you about the other 2 workshops. What I can say is I heard many murmurings saying about how good and useful this or that was. Remember Pauls remark earlier? Well even if not experts with a capital E they certainly were in my humble opinion. Made more so by their obvious love of the subject. We finished with a short Taizé service.

There is talk of another School of Prayer and I would recommend it highly to everyone. I shall certainly go myself. I would like to thank Jane for suggesting and organising the day and all those who led the workshops.



# Evidence

A great wild-life success over many years has been the owl-

nesting box installed in local woodland. During the winter the box is occupied by grey squirrels who sometimes sit on the top as if they own it and I wondered if this would prevent the female tawny owl from nesting. However, last week all the comfy squirrel bedding of moss and dry leaves was ejected by the owl who needs no nesting material. She has begun to incubate and since the trees are not yet in leaf there is sufficient light to see a round feathered face through the aperture in the front of the box.

The roe deer are very active. While a thorough nuisance in some places, destroying gardens or causing serious traffic accidents, they are still a novelty

here, often delighting walkers by making a sudden appearance. What fascinates me is their stealth and ability to vanish by blending with their surroundings. Behind the RSPCA centre I could see a tree stump with a patch of weathered bark resembling the face of a deer. Upon further inspection it was a deer. Somehow the creature had contrived to freeze with legs close together somewhere

and head held erect to look as wooden as any stump. I could make out its companions ambling about in a cool and unperturbed manner further back among the trees.

As the snowdrops are fading, signs of transition from winter into spring can be seen. Song thrushes have begun their high-energy output although not yet at full volume, there is nuthatch activity around a hole in a tree and the pond in the King's Meadow is half filled with frogspawn. On Holroyd's field a flock of fieldfares, colourful winter thrushes, is feeding and chattering noisily. Soon they will re-cross the North Sea on a return journey to their native Scandinavia.

Bright and brassy yellow flowers of coltsfoot gleam at the side of the path. The scientific name of Tussilago is derived from Latin for 'cough remedy' and coltsfoot figures in Culpeper's Herbal originally published in 1652. 'The plant is under Venus: the fresh leaves or juice, or a syrup thereof is good for a hot, dry cough, or wheezing (sic) and shortness of breath.'


