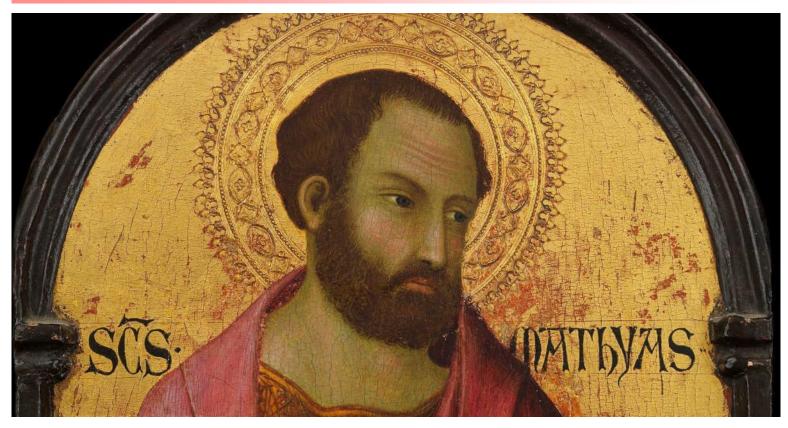

St Matthias the Apostle



After Judas Iscariot betrayed Jesus, the apostles brought their number back to twelve by choosing Matthias to replace him. He was chosen by lot from amongst the disciples.

The author of the Acts of the Apostles sees apostleship differently from St Paul and seems to prefer the understanding of the gospel of Luke. The number had to be restored so that they might 'sit on thrones judging the twelve tribes of Israel'. It was conditional that they had to have been with Jesus during his earthly ministry and had witnessed the resurrection. (The point of being chosen by lot, rather than by some democratic method, indicated the election or choosing by God, rather than by mortals.)

First reading

A reading from the Acts of the Apostles.

In those days Peter stood up among the believers (together the crowd numbered about one hundred and twenty persons) and said, 'Friends, the scripture had to be fulfilled, which the Holy Spirit through David foretold concerning Judas, who became a guide for those who arrested Jesus—for he was numbered among us and was allotted his share in this ministry.' (Now this man acquired a field with the reward of his wickedness; and falling headlong, he burst open in the middle and all his bowels gushed out. This became known to all the residents of Jerusalem, so that the field was

called in their language *Hakeldama*, that is, 'Field of Blood'.) 'For it is written in the book of Psalms, "Let his homestead become desolate, and let there be no one to live in it"; and "Let another take his position of overseer." So one of the men who have accompanied us during all the time that the Lord Jesus went in and out among us, beginning from the baptism of John until the day when he was taken up from us—one of these must become a witness with us to his resurrection.'

So they proposed two, Joseph called Barsabbas, who was also known as Justus, and Matthias. Then they prayed and said, 'Lord, you know everyone's heart. Show us which one of these two you have chosen to take the place in this ministry and apostleship from which Judas turned aside to go to his own place.' And they cast lots for them, and the lot fell on Matthias; and he was added to the eleven apostles.

Second reading

A reading from the St Paul's First Letter of Paul to the Corinthians.

Think of us in this way, as servants of Christ and stewards of God's mysteries. Moreover, it is required of stewards that they be found trustworthy. But with me it is a very small thing that I should be judged by you or by any human court. I do not even judge myself. I am not aware of anything against myself, but I am not thereby acquitted. It is the Lord who judges me. Therefore do not pronounce judgement before the time, before the Lord comes, who will bring to light the things now hidden in darkness and will disclose the purposes of the heart. Then each one will receive commendation from God. I have applied all this to Apollos and myself for your benefit, brothers and sisters, so that you may learn through us the meaning of the saying, 'Nothing beyond what is written,' so that none of you will be puffed up in favour of one against another. For who sees anything different in you? What do you have that you did not receive? And if you received it, why do you boast as if it were not a gift?

Gospel reading

Hear the Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to John All Glory to you O Lord.

Jesus said to his disciples, 'As the Father has loved me, so I have loved you; abide in my love. Sermon

Today our worship remembers St Matthias, the apostle who replaced Judas after his suicide. To the Jews, the idea of *twelve* disciples was important, for it supplied important echoes of the twelve tribes of Israel or the twelve minor prophets. Losing Judas was awful, for a many formerly a friend had become the instrument of Jesus' betrayal, but his death meant they also lost the sense of wholeness the number twelve offered.

Although Matthias was not appointed an apostle until after Christ's death, he was clearly a close friend of Jesus before. Tradition suggests that his own Christian discipleship began quite early in Jesus' ministry, when he first followed Jesus, then made a commitment, which he followed with baptised. He had faith in Jesus just as we do.

Matthias was chosen by lot which, to our modern minds, is a method that sounds uncomfortably close to gambling. In fact, the passage in Acts is saturated with the idea of the disciples praying intensely beforehand, but, nevertheless, no modern church would choose or elect using such a method; we would probably discuss then vote.

Jesus speaks into the discomfort we feel about the story from Acts when he says, 'You did not choose me but I chose you.' He suggests an element of divine control here: we may think we're doing things because we follow our own decisions but, in fact, he implanted the divine desires that underpinned the choice(s) we make.

All of us need to make choices ... and do so all the time. Many of those choices are trivial: 'What do I eat for breakfast; do I wear a blue shirt today or a white one?' and so on. Other choices may be important but most do not bear a great weight of consequence. In fact, our largest and most important choices generally involve relationships because it is that way we share our lives. We choose the people whom we trust; we decide to whom we give time and, most importantly, we must choose the people whom we love.

Love is the best lens through which to make decisions because it involves God and 'God is love' (1 John 4:16). That's why, if Jesus is God, then inevitably when he chose us, the choice would have involved love.

'Choosing in love' is *not* the same as operating on the level of emotion. The Bible is very clear that love is always more about doing than feeling.

'Choosing in love' may seem a strange concept but is usually quite simple in practice. It requires that every decision starts with a series of short questions, 'What does God want?' and 'What would love look like in this situation?' If that questioning is difficult, try reciting St Paul's hymn to love from 1 Corinthians 13:

Love is patient;

love is kind:

love is not envious or boastful or arrogant or rude.

It does not insist on its own way;

it is not irritable or resentful;

it does not rejoice in wrongdoing, but rejoices in the truth.

It bears all things, believes all things, hopes all things, endures all things.

Love never ends. *1Corinthians 13:4–8*

then, against each decision, ask questions like, 'Which choice will result in a person who is more patient?' or 'Which choice will make me more kind?' or 'Am I even considering this choice because I'm starting from a position of envy; will the result be something I can boast about; will it make me more arrogant or lead to my being / seeming rude?' The actual questions will of course vary according to context, but the general idea is obvious enough.

We will have choices today, tomorrow, and every day. In all these ways, and against every choice, start by wanting to be Godly and, as a means to that end, consider what entails love.

Help us to be numbered among those who speak the truth from our hearts and do not slander with our tongues; among those who give their word to their neighbour and do not go back on their promises; among those who recognise the outcast as the one whom they need, who forgive to seventy times seven; those who depend on the mercy of God and live the highest law that is love.

The local community

Lord, when we think there is no one in our community able to carry out a certain task, give us the grace to look again. Give us the inspiration to look at our neighbours in a new light, and to see in them the possibilities that you see. And then if the task is in accordance with your will, we ask you to inspire them, the overlooked, to offer themselves up for service.

All In your mercy, hear our prayer.

Those who suffer

Lord, let us not fear the suffering that may come with giving ourselves to you and acknowledging that fact to the world. We bring before you all those martyrs in the past, who suffered for their faith. We bring before you most urgently the plight of Christians in countries where they are now being persecuted to the point of violence. We ask you both to fortify them and also to soften the hearts of their enemies against them. Lord, help us like Matthias to serve you in the way you most desire from us:
