

Second reading

A reading from St Paul's Second Letter to the Corinthians

We want you to know, brothers and sisters, about the grace of God that has been granted to the churches of Macedonia; for during a severe ordeal of affliction, their abundant joy and their extreme poverty have overflowed in a wealth of generosity on their part. For, as I can testify, they voluntarily gave according to their means, and even beyond their means, begging us earnestly for the privilege of sharing in this ministry to the saints—and this, not merely as we expected; they gave themselves first to the Lord and, by the will of God, to us, so that we might urge Titus that, as he had already made a beginning, so he should also complete this generous undertaking among you.

Now as you excel in everything—in faith, in speech, in knowledge, in utmost eagerness, and in our love for you—so we want you to excel also in this generous undertaking. I do not say this as a command, but I am testing the genuineness of your love against the earnestness of others. For you know the generous act of our Lord Jesus Christ, that though he was rich, yet for your sakes he became poor, so that by his poverty you might become rich. And in this matter I am giving my advice: it is appropriate for you who began last year not only to do something but even to desire to do something— now finish doing it, so that your eagerness may be matched by completing it according to your means. For if the eagerness is there, the gift is acceptable according to what one has—not according to what one does

not have. I do not mean that there should be relief for others and pressure on you, but it is a question of a fair balance between your present abundance and their need, so that their abundance may be for your need, in order that there may be a fair balance. As it is written, 'The one who had much did not have too much, and the one who had little did not have too little.'

Gospel reading

Hear the Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to Mark All Glory to you O Lord.

When Jesus had crossed again in the boat to the other side, a great crowd gathered around him; and he was by the sea. Then one of the leaders of the synagogue named Jairus came and, when he saw him, fell at his feet and begged him repeatedly, 'My little daughter is at the point of death. Come and lay your hands on her, so that she may be made well, and live.'

So he went with him. And a large crowd followed him and pressed in on him. Now there was a woman who had been suffering from haemorrhages for twelve years. She had endured much under many physicians, and had spent all that she had; and she was no better, but rather grew worse. She had heard about Jesus, and came up behind him in the crowd and touched his cloak, for she said, 'If I but touch his clothes, I will be made well.' Immediately her haemorrhage stopped; and she felt in her body that she was healed of her disease. Immediately aware that power had gone forth from him, Jesus turned about in the crowd and said, 'Who touched my clothes?' And his disciples said to him, 'You see the crowd pressing in on you; how can you say, "Who touched me?" 'He looked all around to see who had done it. But the woman, knowing what had happened to her, came in fear and trembling, fell down before him, and told him the whole truth. He said to her, 'Daughter, your faith has made you well; go in peace, and be healed of your disease.'

While he was still speaking, some people came from the leader's house to say, 'Your daughter is dead. Why trouble the teacher any further?' But overhearing what they said, Jesus said to the leader of the synagogue, 'Do not fear, only believe.'

He allowed no one to follow him except Peter, James, and John, the brother of James. When they came to the house of the leader of the synagogue, he saw a commotion, people weeping and wailing loudly. When he had entered, he said to them, "Why do you make a commotion and weep? The child is not dead but sleeping.' And they laughed at him. Then he put them all outside, and took the child's father and mother and those who were with him, and went in where the child was. He took her by the hand and said to her, "Talitha cum," which means, 'Little girl, get up!' And immediately the girl got up and began to walk about (she was twelve years of age). At this they were overcome with amazement. He strictly ordered them that no one should know this, and told them to give her something to eat. *Mark* 5:21-end

Sermon

The time of the Judges is a period when Israel had no real central authority except the worship of God. It was organised around regional tribal areas and this made it very vulnerable to the surrounding nations. A pattern develops of God bringing rescue from their predicament, a generation that remembers and keeps true, a generation that doesn't care much and a generation that forgets and rebels at which point God allows the victory of the invaders and a period of trouble—then they remember and cry out and he sends a leader of his choice and gifting (known as a Judge) to be the means of rescue.

Beginnings and first lessons

Our story starts with the people under the thumb of the Philistines for 40 years—a grouping of city states made up of people from Greek background who lived there for several hundred years. And we also start with a miraculous birth—we have more than one in the record starting with the birth of Isaac, then Samuel, John the Baptist – then the ultimate special miracle of the birth of Jesus.

The gift of the birth of Samson came with a codicil from God—he is to be brought up under Nazirite vows. These were normally for a limited time of commitment to holiness and marked by not cutting one's hair—but Samson's is from birth.

These miracle births in scripture are not casual—these people are given by and gifted from God for particular purposes so we need to take note of them.

Our first lesson though is that Samson had the looks of a Nazirite but did not own any of the behaviours—his oath was made for him not owned by him. We need to be sure we are not relying on anyone else in our commitment but give ourselves to his service and love ourselves.

Samson is for years a thorn in the side of the Philistines. His God-given strength was overwhelming and the various tales of his prowess show us how irresistible he was when roused. He's in many ways an impressive figure. In his strength and ability he struts the stage—Elvis, George Best, and Barry John come to mind as people of supreme confidence in their remarkable gifts and showed it in their use of it.

But there are buts. He never seems capable of an action that truly breaks the power of the enemy. He comes over too as a man of unbridled lusts—a user of prostitutes and reacting to appearance not character.

But also, I would suggest extremely popular as a figure head for resistance.

His downfall comes as a result of these failures of character (and of keeping the more challenging part of his vow!). Delilah wheedles his secret out of him after him having lied to her about it before. His strength is destroyed, the one part of his vow he has kept (his hair) is taken from him, and he is blinded to make him a laughing stock and to ensure an end to hopes for Israel.

Our second lesson is that without a true personal commitment into God's calling on us we can seem to be being effective while missing God's best.

Success at cost

I sense that Samson is being used now as a talisman of Philistine victory. What is tragic is the depth to which he has fallen—blinded and helpless and a target for mockery, a sense of failure.

Yet now in the midst of imposed darkness there is a chance for reflection and indeed for prayer. And in prison his hair begins to grow. And the chance comes—all the leaders of Philistia join together to celebrate victory and in their midst is the scarecrow figure of their defeated foe. The Temple of Dagon where they meet has two pillars to support it and Samson has the chance to reach out and take hold and seeking God's help this time is given the chance to bring the whole pile down on their heads. In his death he achieves the victory over the enemies of God and of Israel. Note that this rather odd figure has four full chapters recording his life yet so much is about a failure of character and lost opportunities yet here is victory.

Our final lessons today are about parallels. In his death Samson reaches out his arms and takes strength from God in the midst of his weakness to destroy the rulers who hold God's people in thrall and shows the absolute weakness of the god

of the Philistines. Our Jesus in great weakness stretches out his hands and tears down the power of sin and the devil and even death itself as he dies to save us. Note that Samson is forced into his sacrifice, while Jesus chooses his path.

Let us commit ourselves afresh today to our amazing Jesus, let us seek to love him and follow him to the uttermost.
